The State's Biennial Budget, School Funding, and the Impact on Local Property Taxes

On July 8th, 2021, the Governor signed the 2021-23 State of Wisconsin biennial budget. The biennial budget always has implications for school funding, but no one could have predicted what has transpired this budget cycle. For the next two years, there will be no per pupil adjustments and no increase to the low revenue ceiling adjustment. Last year the per pupil adjustment was \$179 per pupil and the low revenue ceiling increase was \$600 per pupil. Wisconsin state statutes limit the amount of revenue that a school board may acquire by levying taxes through a formula called the revenue limit. The major components that make up the revenue limit are state equalization aid and local property taxes. In the biennial budget, federal dollars that were to be allocated to school districts to address learning loss due to COVID, have been distributed to schools in the form of equalization aid without allowing an increase in the revenue limit. This is like getting an increase in pay but not being allowed to spend it. In fact, an increase in equalization aid has no impact on a school's operating budget. State equalization aid and local property taxes are indirectly proportional as one goes up the other goes down to equal the set revenue limit. By redirecting the federal dollars into equalization aid without increasing the revenue limit, the joint finance committee has circumvented the intent of the federal money by providing property tax relief as opposed to its intended use, to support the academic recovery of our children.

This, the first year of the biennial budget, the mill rate for the school district has decreased to \$8.73. This is a \$.60 decline from last year. This is a significant reduction from the 10-year average mill rate of \$9.39. While property tax relief is popular, it will, most likely, be temporary.

There is a big problem with this funding tactic which the joint finance committee openly admits – the fiscal cliff. In two years, the influx of federal money will stop, and property taxes are projected to go back up, significantly. As inflation rises (The consumer price index is currently estimated to be around 4% as opposed to 1.23% last year.) it increases the strain on the district's operational budget as the revenue limit will not have increased for 2 years. While many legislators state they are saving a state surplus to offset the impending fiscal cliff, the simple fact is they can't. "One legislature cannot dictate action by a future legislature or a future legislative committee." State ex rel. Warren v. Nusbaum, 59 Wis. 2d 391, 208 N.W.2d 780.

In the face of an uncertain fiscal future, the school district is being proactive. The general operating fund for 2021-22 is balanced. Funds are being put into a defeasance to reduce future payments on the referendum debt. Additional staff, who are here to address learning loss and mitigate COVID related issues are being funded, not by the general fund, but by ESSER II & III grant monies. The district is also leveraging ESSER funds to assist with maintenance projects within the building.

As a community, we must continue to remain focused on creating a safe and supportive environment that promotes academic and emotional growth for all students, regardless of the uncertainty caused by COVID-19 and the unpredictable fiscal landscape.

	General Fund Expenditures	Increasing 1.62%. Increase in fund expenditures is from one -time Federal ESSER II monies that were allocated to school districts to mitigate the effects of COVID.
	Fund Balance	No significant change. The 2020-21 budget year resulted in an increased fund balance largely because of activities that did not occur because of COVID. The 2021-22 budget is balanced.
	Property Tax Levy	Decreasing 0.7%. This is due to several factors: (1) three- year rolling average enrollment reduction; (2) increasing property values; (3) increasing state equalization aid; and (4) decreasing revenue limit authority.
₽	Mill Rate	Decreasing 6.4 %. This \$0.60 per \$1000 decrease (from \$9.33 to \$8.73) is a result of the same factors listed above, especially the increase in equalization aid. This is a 2-year situation, until the federal \$ ends.
1	Staffing Level (Overall)	Increase. With ESSER II \$ a reading interventionist, guidance counselor, in-house substitute, and .5 technology support person have been added to staff.

ACCESS for ELs	State Required	ACCESS for ELLs (Assessing Comprehension and Communication in English State-to-State for English Language Learners) is a secure large-scale English language proficiency assessment given to Kindergarten through 12th graders who have been identified as English language learners (ELLs). It is given annually in WIDA Consortium member states to monitor students' progress in acquiring academic English. The test assesses the four language domains of Listening, Speaking, Reading, and Writing.		
Forward Exam (or DLM)	State Required	An online assessment for Wisconsin students. The new custom assessment will be administered in English language arts and mathematics in grades 3 through 8, in science in grades 4 and 8, and in social studies in 4, 8, and 10.		
		The DLM [™] assessment measures the academic progress of students with significant cognitive disabilities in the subject areas of English language arts and mathematics for students in grades 3-11 as well as science for students in grades 4 and 8-11. This is an online assessment delivered either via the computer; however, some students may need their teacher to present the items to them. The teacher will then enter the student's response into the online platform.

ACT Plus Writing	T Plus Writing State Required A paper pencil test given to 11th grade students which measures Reading, Ma Science and Writing. Scores from the administration of The ACT Plus Writing (i with ACT Standard Time or ACT-approved accommodations) can be used by st a variety of purposes including college admission, scholarships, course placem NCAA eligibility.			
		WI Act 55 requires students, starting with the class of 2017, graduating from a Wisconsin high school to take and pass a civics test comprised of 100 questions that are identical to the US Citizenship and Immigration Services test to receive a diploma. Students need to answer 65 questions correctly

At Cochrane-Fountain City School, we know the importance of school meals in fueling both healthy minds and bodies. Even though school meals may look a little different during School Year 2021-2022, please know that your school nutrition team is working hard to ensure students have safe, nutritious, and appealing meals. Today, I am writing to share how our district is working to overcome food supply and labor challenges related to the Coronavirus (COVID-19) public health emergency so that students continue to receive school meals.

At times, our school district may not receive expected food orders due to labor shortages (such as delivery drivers) and limited product availability (for example, discontinued products or not enough of a specific type of product). As a result, your school may need to make last-minute changes to the menu or substitute a different brand of a food product. We know that students have favorite menu items and are working hard to provide them whenever possible. We are also thinking ahead to identify alternative food items that are nutritious and appealing for the students.

If your student has food allergies or a special dietary need, be assured that meeting these needs and keeping your student safe remains a priority for us, and we will continue to provide meal modifications. If your student requires a meal modification, please make sure the necessary documentation is located with our school nurse's office. 


Fall Sports Recap
