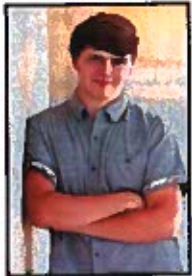

**Karter Domine Named a 2022
U.S. Presidential Scholar Candidate
Semifinalist in
Career and Technical Education**



The White House Commission on Presidential Scholars selects scholars annually for the U.S. Presidential Scholars Award based on student's academic success, artistic and technical excellence, essays, school evaluations and transcripts, evidence of community service, leadership, a demonstrated commitment to high ideals and scores earned on College Board ACT exams.

U.S. Presidential Scholars are comprised of one young man and one young woman from each state, the District of Columbia and Puerto Rico, and U.S. families living abroad, as well as 15 chosen at-large, 20 Scholars in the arts and 20 Scholars who demonstrate ability and accomplishment in career and technical education fields.

Finalists for the award will be recognized this summer.

2022 Senior Athlete Honors



Each spring, the head coaches at C-FC select seniors to receive the *Senior Athletic Awards*. The following were recipients of this year's awards:

C-FC Senior Male & Female Athletes



The varsity coaches at C-FC select one male and one female athlete who have shown scholastic and athletic excellence, are team players, are coachable and who are leaders on and off the field to be awarded the Senior Athlete award. These two athletes receive a plaque at the Awards Program.

This year's Senior Athletes are Haili Brone and Austin Becker. Haili lettered 9 times during her high school career participating in volleyball, basketball and track. Austin lettered 9 times in his career participating in football, basketball and baseball.

WIAA Scholar Athletes



To qualify for WIAA Scholar Athlete recognition, a nominee must have earned at least four varsity letters through the first half of his/her senior year and must have a cumulative grade point average of at least 3.0 on a 4.0 scale.

In addition to local awards, 32 of the more than 700 students nominated each year are selected for statewide recognition. Four boys and four girls in each of four WIAA divisions are honored at a ceremony held on the first Sunday of May each year in Wausau. Recipients for C-FC this year are Karter Domine and Haili Brone.

John Philip Sousa Awards

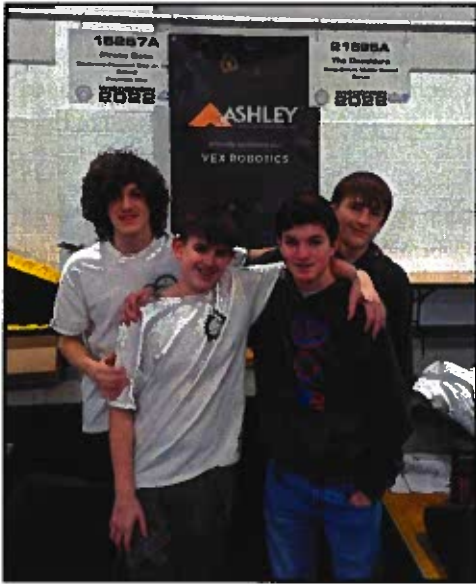

Robotics Team Qualifies For Nationals



On Sunday, March 13 the Cochrane-Fountain City Junior High Robotics team competed at the VEX IQ State Robotics Tournament held at the Fox Valley Exhibition Center in Appleton, Wisconsin. The team of Rylee Cooke, Hunter Earney, Trevor Ehrat, and Stevie Meyer were one of 47 teams to compete. After eight collaboration matches, the team was ranked 11 out of 47 going into the final round. The Pirate Bots jumped into first place with only 5 matches to follow. Through the following four gut-wrenching rounds they remained in first place. The final match of the day saw another group take first and the Pirates ended the event with a 2nd place finish. Second place was enough to qualify for the VEX IQ Robotics World Championship held in Dallas, Texas in May. Over 50 countries and all 50 United States will be represented there. The C-FC team will compete in the "Engineering" Division.

FBLA Sends Seven to Nationals

This past March twelve members of the Cochrane-Fountain City FBLA chapter competed at the 2022 State Leadership Conference in Madison, Wisconsin. It was an eventful two days with the attendees competing, going to workshops and seeing the sights of Madison.

The conference kicked off the morning of March 28 at the Alliant Energy Center. Competition began in the afternoon. Members were coming and going to their test sites to take their objective test, preliminary test, or preliminary presentation. Those with preliminary events were hoping to score high enough to make the final round and present. The busy first day concluded with testing that evening. We found out later that night that two teams from our chapter had scored high enough to make finals and would present the next morning.

The next day our qualifying members competed in their final round. In between the conclusion of finals and closing ceremony where they would announce the results, we explored State Street in Madison. The conference concluded that afternoon with the closing ceremony and competition results.

Placing in the top four at the state conference qualified these individuals to compete at the National Leadership Conference in Chicago, Illinois to be on June 28-July 3. This year's Mission and Impact Conference focused on finding yourself within FFA. Lastly, Lauren Abramson attended Halftime Conference on January 14 and 15. Halftime was about getting FFA members ready for the college admissions process.

Old Time Farm Fest has been a part of our community for 27 years and C-FC FFA has always volunteered to help work. Unfortunately, Farm Fest has come to an end and the Lions Club gifted the C-FC FFA Chapter with a check of \$3,000. In November, Mark Jungerberg traveled to C-FC to present the check to the Chapter; Donniejo Dittrich accepted it.

C-FC FFA had a record breaking year for Fruit Sale. With over 100 members participating, the chapter sold over \$82,000! This year over 70 members sold their quota of \$500. Members who sold their quota got to enjoy a game night at Nate & Ally's in Winona along with a meal of sandwiches and ice cream.

Throughout the year FFA members are given opportunities for community service. On October 16 Emma Mann and Savannah Foust attended the Buckthorn Project. They got to meet Adam Foehringer from the DNR and Tim Wurcherer the Conservationist to learn about Buckthorn. Then they spent the morning cutting down the invasive species. On December 4, the annual PTO Craft Fair was held. Every year C-FC FFA helps vendors move into their booths in the morning. 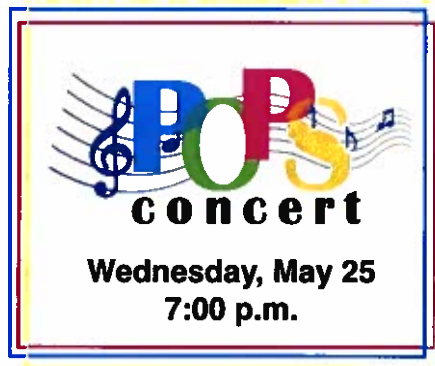
As a small, rural school district our capacity to offer a large variety of courses is limited. By creating partnerships with other institutions, such as RVA, we are expanding student access to courses that we otherwise would not be able to offer.

C-FC/RVA has two programs available for C-FC students:

FULL TIME. This is a completely virtual learning experience for students in grades PK-12. Virtual does not mean 100% online. Families have a choice regarding curriculum, book-based work, synchronous and asynchronous learning. Parents/guardians work in conjunction with RVA staff to determine the best fit for each student. Students can still take classes like art and music at C-FC, if they wish, and are eligible to participate in C-FC athletics and club activities. Student must participate in state testing and will receive a C-FC diploma upon successful completion of 12th grade.

DISTRICT CONNECT. RVA offers virtual curriculum where individual courses may be done online, independently or as a synchronous, remote learning class with an RVA teacher. For example, at C-FC we are limited in the types of science courses we offer. Through RVA, however, C-FC students can take classes like astronomy, biotechnology, forensic science, marine science and sports medicine.

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- 2 four oz bottles of washable school glue
- 1 cup white flour
- 4-5 cups plain white shaving foam
- food coloring
- 1 gallon plastic zipper bag
- sandwich sized zipper bags, 1 per food color
- optional: squirt bottles
- baby or some kind of wipes for cleanup

1. In a gallon-size plastic zipper bag add 1 cup of flour.
2. Pour both bottles of washable school glue on top of the flour. Make sure it's *washable* for easy clean up!
3. Spray about 4-5 cups of shaving foam into the bag.
4. Close the bag and knead it for a few minutes until everything is totally mixed.
5. Snip one corner of the big bag and squirt into sandwich-sized plastic zipper bags to divide it up per color.
6. Add 10 drops of one food coloring to each bag.
7. Knead each smaller bag until color is throughout all the bag. Snip off the edge and squirt into plastic squirt bottles. Or you can be frugal and just paint with the zipper bags. If you keep it in the bags, just snip off a tiny corner, so it doesn't come out too heavy.

Free and reduced applications will be available in August and families are encouraged to apply.
- *Please check your family's lunch balance to make sure it is not negative. Also, if your student is graduating and no other siblings are at C-FC, contact the office if you would like to receive a refund.
