C-FC Preschool & 4K 5 DAYS A WEEK!

The Cochrane-Fountain City School District will expand its educational and play-based curriculum to offer five days a week to all three and four-year-old children next school year. We owe this expansion to the success of our highly effective five-day-a-week spring pilot, thanks to the dedication and hard work of our 4K teachers Pam Prenot and Sarah Puetz, along with other staff members.

The 4K program for next year will continue to be available to all children who turn four by September 1, 2024, and reside within the C-FC school district or accepted through open enrollment. Families will only be charged for meals unless they apply for income reduction, based on the free-reduced guidelines provided by the state.

Our preschool program for next year will be available to all children who turn three by September 1, 2024, and reside within the C-FC school district at a rate of \$25 a day, plus meals. Families can apply for tuition reduction, based on the free and reduced guidelines provided by the state.

The district remains committed to providing all three- and four-year-old children with a place to come to school five days a week to meet the needs expressed by families, prepare all students for future success in school and life, and bridge the gap between needs and resources for our families.
